Foreign Dentists in Trouble

Henry James Miller and Julius Fay proprietors of an establishment known as the "Louvre Dentaire", have been condemned by the Paris Tribunal for practising medicine illegally. Mr. Miller holds a diploma from the Imperial Academy of St. Petersburg and the University of Philadelphia, while Mr. Fay claims to be a member of the London College of Surgeons.

Last August a Mme Bizourd was under Mr. Fay's treatment for toothache, and it was found necessary to extract a molar. The dentist injected cocaine into the gums, and the lady became exceedingly ill. Her husband complained to the police, with the result that Messrs. Fay and Miller were charged with wounding by imprudence, and with illegal practice of medicine. The defence of the accused dentists was that Mme Bizourd's accident was due to her hysterical condition and not to the cocaine treatment. The evidence of the medical experts was in direct contradiction to this. Dr Brouardel, who stated that Mme Bizourd had never suffered from hysteria, protested against the administration of cocaine by dentists, which he considers a very dangerous practice, thirty-seven deaths having already been traced to these injections. Dr Brouardel also stated that one of his colleagues had got the University of Philadelphia to confer a diploma upon his footman by paying 20£. Mr. Miller was acquitted on the charge of wounding by imprudence, his colleague being fined 4£. They were each fined 12s for illegal practice of medicine.
